My Walk Along the Wall

On my way to my local café for coffee and cake (well, we should all have a treat now and again) I walk besides a tall red brick wall. To take my mind off the busy traffic dashing past I look to see what plants I can see growing in the wall.

Near the top is a buddleia. We know the plant as butterfly bush and many of us have it in our gardens and are able to enjoy the butterflies it attracts. Buddleia was bought over from the west of China in 1890. The name, which was given by Carl Linnaeus, posthumously honoured the botanist and rector Reverend Adam Budd.

Lower down in the wall are some dandelions, their bright yellow flowers lighting up the bricks. As a child I was told not to pick these flowers because they made you wet the bed. One of the old names is Tiddle bed and, to seal the 'wetting the bed' theory, 100 years ago monks used dandelion as a diuretic.

The next plant to catch my eye is a small dark green fern tucked into the space between the bricks. Its name is wall rue. The leaves are not fern-like but more rounded, a little like clover. Wall rue was once believed to have magical properties and was used in spells and charms.

A little further on again, growing out of the cracks between the bricks is a tiny fern. Not being an expert on ferns, I turn to the help of my trusty flower book and find that it is called maidenhair spleenwort. It is certainly very beautiful.

Last on my list are one or two ivy-leaved toadflax. This pretty lilac and yellow flower arrived here in the 17th century from southern Europe. They may have come in packaging that was wrapped around marble statues imported from Italy to Oxford. Ivy-leaved toadflax has an intriguing mechanism that enables it to colonise walls and rocks. When in bloom the flower stalks bend towards the light but when flowering is finished the seed heads bend the other way so that the seeds are more likely to shed into the cracks and mortar joints. All very clever!

I hope these plants will go on adorning this wall so that I can always enjoy their company on my way to coffee and cake.
