Small acts can make a big difference to wildlife

We have been hearing from local members wishing to share their experiences of wildlife in the Redditch area. One member has reported what appear to be positive signs on swift numbers; only four were around at the start of spring but that increased to 12 birds later in the summer.

Members have been improving the wildlife friendliness of their gardens by planting flowers that are popular with pollinators, installing ponds, changing their lawns to wildflower areas, using feeders and nest boxes and installing bat boxes. All of these small acts add up and make a real difference to wildlife in the town.

Foxes have been seen visiting gardens, even breeding in one garden with four cubs putting in regular appearances. Other mammals visiting gardens include hedgehogs, badgers, muntjac deer and bats. One member has reported visits by bats that are very much up this year compared to the last 10 years.



Several different species of birds have been reported nesting in gardens, using natural sites such as hedges as well as nest boxes. Young families have been seen, including blue and great tits, robins, goldfinches, house sparrows, blackbirds, starlings and dunnocks.

Insects have been reported including oak and speckled bush-crickets. And a few brightly coloured mullein moth caterpillars were reported nibbling the leaves of a verbascum in a garden. They grew to around 4cm before disappearing, presumably going into the next stage of their life cycle. The caterpillars' scientific name *Cucullia verbasci* provides clues to their preferred diet.

We would like to do more to promote and protect the wildlife of Redditch through our on-going programme of events. We still need more help from willing volunteers to build on the good start we've made. If you can spare a small amount of time then please get in touch (garyla@outlook.com).
