Every penny helps

From £1 to £1,000, every pound you raise can make a significant impact. Look at the examples below to see what difference your contributions could make.

£10

Could buy:

20 tree guards for new woodlands or hedges

£25

Could buy:

- A dormouse nest box
- A fruit tree to plant in one of our traditional orchards

£50

Could buy:

- A bat box
- An owl box
- 75 hawthorn saplings to improve our hedges
- School visits for 10 children

£100

Could buy:

- A bat detector
- Five new loppers for our volunteer work parties

£500

Could buy:

- Several remote cameras to help monitor wildlife on our nature reserves
- Three to five days with a digger to help us create new ponds and wetland features

Fundraising checklist

Choose your fundraiser

Whether you are a budding baker, a fantastic footballer or a wildlife wanderer, there are a variety of events and activities that you can organise. For more inspiration, check out some of our ideas on pp.8–9.

∠ Who, when and where?

Once you have decided what you would like to do, it's time to organise your venue and the date, as well as get invitations sent out if you're hosting an event. Maybe it will be in your back garden, a local park or village hall, the choice is yours. Also consider the time of year you are holding your activity and potential bad weather plans.

✓ Setting a goal

We are grateful for any donation, big or small, but setting a goal can be a great focus for you and encourage people to donate to help you reach your goal.

✓ Shout about it

Publicise your activities to help raise awareness and donations – social media, word of mouth and posters or leaflets are all great methods. See more tips on p.11.

Stay green, stay clean

We are incredibly grateful to you fundraising for Worcestershire Wildlife Trust but we want to make sure you're doing it in an environmentally friendly way to help further protect Worcestershire's wildlife, so read our top tips below.

- Avoid activities such as balloon or lantern releases as these can be harmful to the environment and potentially be distressing to livestock.
- Avoid waste such as disposable cups and cutlery, instead opting for reusable options.
- Check out our cake flags and bunting for plastic free decorations for your event.
- Dispose of any waste from your event in a responsible way, recycling or reusing anything where possible.
- Host your event in an easily accessible place to encourage the use of public transport or ride sharing to reduce carbon emissions.
- Although paper is a great alternative to plastic, minimising paper use is still beneficial to the environment, so limit the use of posters and paper copies of information and instead opting for digital versions where possible.
- Utilising social media is a great way of communicating information but it may not be accessible for everyone so bear this in mind.

Shout about it

What you're doing is amazing and you should let the world know about it. Not only that but it can also help raise awareness and extra donations. Here's some tips to help you promote your event or activity.

Utilise social media

Social media can be a great tool to spread information about your event or activity to a far-ranging audience for free. Creating a page or event and keeping it updated with photos and stories throughout the planning and delivery of your event or activity can be a great way to keep up engagement. Be sure to tag us in any social media posts.

If you are undertaking a fitness challenge, tracking apps such as Strava can be a great tool to share your training and progress in the lead up to the big event. Other users can follow you on the app or you can share your progress across other social media.

Contact the press

Local press may be interested in hearing about the amazing work you're doing, so contact local newspapers, parish council magazines and papers and radio stations. Be aware that some publications start planning their content far in advance so as soon as you know the details of your event, contact them. Remember to follow the five w's when talking about your event or activity: who, what, when, where and why? Please also get in touch with us before contacting the press and we can give you some great, specific tips on what to say.

Design resources

If you're more on the creative side, designing eye-catching posters or leaflets can be a great resource to either print out, share across social media or email round to contacts. We have already designed some handy resources for you - a sponsorship form, cake flags and a bunting template are all available to download from our website, and printed versions are available on request. We also have a variety of leaflets available, so contact us if you're interested in any of these.



Staying safe and legal

With everything you do when organising and participating in your event or activity, make sure it is legal and you are putting the safety of yourself and everyone else first. Although it may not be the most exciting part of organising your event, it is vital that it is considered.

Permission

If you are holding your activity or event on private property, you will have to gain permission from the landowner. If the event is taking place on public property, such as a park, you will need to obtain a licence through your local authority.

Rick assessment

We suggest carrying out a risk assessment, depending on your event or activity, to assess the risks involved and help avoid or mitigate them. There are plenty of templates available online and guidance is available from the Health and Safety Executive (www.hse.gov.uk).





First aid

Consider the need for first aid at your event or activity. Contact St Johns Ambulance Service for further guidance and support.

Insurance

Consider public liability insurance for your event.* Although not a legal requirement, it will cover you if an incident or accident occurs during your event or activity. The venue may already have this, so double check with them first.

Food and drink

If you are serving any food or drink at your event, it is important that you follow food safety laws. If you are considering selling alcohol at your event, you will have to complete a Temporary Event Notice if the venue isn't already licensed.
