## Encouraging wildflowers at Piper's Hill

Those of you who have visited Pipers Hill and Dodderhill Common recently will have noticed that the footpath along the power line has become wider.

The work was instigated by safety issues caused by ash dieback along the lines. Most of the reserve is valued for the 280 veteran trees, which is the reason for the Site of Special Scientific Interest SSSI) designation, but this area is dense woodland with very little open space. The need to make the powerlines safe presented the opportunity to create a new woodland ride, bringing a more varied habitat to this part of the reserve.

Natural England gave us consent to fell seven and a half metres of trees on

either side of the powerlines; the majority of those felled were ash. The plan is to allow the ride to regenerate naturally and introduce a three-tier system where a strip each side of the footpath is mown every autumn to encourage wildflowers. The next tier will be allowed to develop into scrub where small sections will be coppiced in different places each year to maintain the age structure of the scrub.

As the ride develops over the next few years we should start to see a variety of plants and invertebrates colonise the area.
